man who can lead the Democratic party to success, because he stands for the strong, progressive policy of the Northwest, as free from the extreme reactionary conservatism of the East, as it is from the radical socialistic propaganda of the Southwest. The latter has led us twice and failed, the former has also brought us to defeat. Can New York lead Democracy to victory in 1908? No, because the vested interests of New York are too cautious to adopt new principles. Can Nebraska lead us to the White House? The hot wind sweeps across Nebraska and dries up the half-matured corn. The statesmen of Nebraska seize half-matured ideas too quickly. Where conditions are hard any change is welcome.

But in the iron ranges, the pine forests, and wheat farms of Minnesota, they have matured a race of men, careful and considerate in judgment but strong and able in achievement, not eager to change old methods but progressive enough to adopt new ideas which have been proven.

BRYAN CLUB ORGANIZES

The Bryan Club was the first to organize among the candidate clubs, and got down to business just before the Nebraskan make his debut in Lexington with his lecture at the skating rink. Many white and blue ribbons were in evidence the day W. J. Bryan arrived, but they have kept in retirement since, though the enthusiasm of which they were the outward sign appears to be no whit diminished. The Bryan Club has a larger enrolment than any other candidate club. Mr. C. I. Carey is president, Mr. W. E. Dameron and Mr. Herold are secretaries. Mr. R. S. Keebler is vice-president. For lack of space we can not give here the resolutions of the club, which have been previously published in all the important papers of Virginia. They indicate a very real enthusiasm at Washington and Lee for the character and record of the great Commoner.
