-Birthright Israel

Deciding to go to Israel was not a hard decision for me. Growing up with a mother who has lived in Israel at three different points in her life, I always assumed it was something I would do eventually. So when I heard about the Taglit - Birthright Israel trip, I knew it would be an amazing opportunity for me to finally go. However, despite the ten hour plane ride from JFK, the excitement of meeting the 39 other Jewish students from across the country, the Hebrew signs lining the streets, and a late night walk on a beach along the Mediterranean Sea, I still felt like I could have been on vacation in the United States.

I didn't really realize that I was in Israel until the third day, when we visited *Tsfat*, a small village in the middle of the Galilee Mountains. Walking on the cobblestone pathways in narrow alleyways, seeing Torahs that were hundreds of years old, and eating falafel in a clearing near the edge of the city, I finally realized that I was in Israel.

From that point, the trip began to really show me what Israel was like as opposed to just being another vacation. We didn't learn just about Jewish culture and history, however. Committed to the Jewish values of accepting and embracing other cultures, we spent time in a Druze village and a Bedouin desert resort, in both places eating traditional food, conversing with natives, and participating in rituals.

Throughout the trip, our leaders continued to ask us whether we felt like tourists. Through the first few days, I answered "yes" without hesitation. But as the trip went on, I realized that visiting Israel was

not like being a tourist in any other country. From being accompanied for five days by our several Israeli soldier "hevre" (friends), to bargaining in the Machne Yehuda market in Jerusalem, I found an amazing sense of belonging and similarity to the Israelis. Also, doing the things my ancestors and Jewish community members had done - hiking Masada to see the sunrise, floating in the Dead Sea, and praying at the Kotel - gave me a further sense of connection to other Jews. While I've never felt ostracized from my religion, or even felt any negative effects of being in the minority, being in Israel made me realize what it would be like to live in a community of Jews. It made me appreciate Judaism and realize the influence it has in who I am. I finally realized that I will never be a tourist in Israel; I will always be welcomed home to a place I belong.

So far this year, we have had two VIP speakers come and speak on rather different topics. In the month of September, Dana Ragosin, the Israeli Emissary of Richmond, came to campus to speak about Israeli affairs in a talk informally titled "Israel: 101." We had a wonderful lunch at the Sheridan Livery, where Dana discussed her life as an Israeli, her role as the Emissary of Richmond, and additional topics from media coverage in Israel to the birthright Israel program.

The second speaker, Professor Mohammed Kamara from the Department of Romance Languages, spoke about Islamic holidays, his life as an American Muslim, and his experiences growing up in Sierra Leone. His talk provided a great cross-cultural perspective and understanding on Islam, and illustrated for Hillel students some of the similarities and differences between Islamic and Jewish holidays.
