

Beginning of Modern Baseball

- From introduction by Cubans in late 1800s,
 Dominican baseball marked by sovereignty and lack of outside influence
- 1956– Ozzie Virgil first Dominican player to play in the Major Leagues
- Free agency and academy system in 1980s changed everything
