Washington & Lee University October 2 nd 1871.

Dear Papa,

As you well know that I am not gifted in the art of letter writing, you can of course look over the many errors which I am afraid I will make in this my first attempt at epistolary correspondence for nearly four years, when I promise that I will try and improve and do better in future. Indeed I have not written for so long that I hardly know how to begin. I ought to have written before this I know, but as Luche wrote about a week ago I thought that that would do for awhile, so I postfronted writing until now, and I fear that I will fail yet for want of something to say. Perhaps an account of my trip to this place would not be wholy imenteresting, so I will try and relate some of the incidents that occurred on that memorable fourney.

Well, we arrived at Covington a few minutes ater eleven oclock, and there we met major Hays, who very kindly invited us to take dinner with him, and being not very hard to persuade to go on such excursions, bave and I went, Luche and the rest of the troupe went to the merchant Hotel in Cincinnati. In the evening we all went to the Exposition which was I expect the fair of the kind ever held in the United States. We spent 6 long hours at the Exposition and I suppose did not see one fourth of articles on exhibition. It would not do for me to try describe any thing I saw as I havent language at my command sufficient to describe it inthems that it deserves, Emugh is to say that it was the grandestaffair that I ever saw or expect to see soon. We left Cincinnati at 10 O clock precisely for Washington, and I think that was about the hardest night el ever spont. We reached Washington the west night about half after eleven. next morning we got separated, I hawhan and myself I went to the depot where our bazzage was, the rest of the party went to another depot.

We found the trunks of the whole party, but as Luche had the checks and also my tichet, we had to Stand on the platform and see the cars more off. When they (the cars) reached the other defrot and they (the loys) saw that neithe we, nor the trunks were aboard, they delivered the checks all over to bave who came back and found us at the hotel, so we had a day in Washington to see the sights and we made use of it too. We went to the Patent Office, the Capital the White House X X. We left Washington Hodnes Thursday morning about & Oclock and arrived at & hoshen about o Oclock. that evening. We then took the stage, over the roughest road lever saw, for Lexington and reached here about I Oclock Friday morning. I was very much disappointed in this town, as I expected to find it about four times as large as it is. We moved to Mrs. Patrick's Friday evening, and remained there until this evening, when Luche and myself moved to Col. Johnstons, and Care went back to hr. Hexander's where he was last year.
