Nannie Elizabeth Walker Wood



Nannie was the second child born to the late Harry L. Walker and the late Eliza Bannister Walker on Sunday, January 7, 1900 in Rockbridge County, Virginia. She was born at "the Farm", a very special place for our family over the years.

Mother accepted Jesus Christ as her personal savior while only seven and was baptized into the fellowship of the First Baptist Church of Lexington, Virginia. She cherished her long-standing membership

of eighty-six consecutive years with First Baptist. That enduring relationship ended when illness necessitated her moving to Philadelphia to live with two of her sons, Clarence and Alexander. True to the church's covenant which mandated, "...when we remove from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church...", she united with the Vine Memorial Baptist Church under the pastorate of the Reverend James S. Allen on Easter Sunrise Morning Service, April 11, 1993.

Mother received her early education in the schools of Lexington, Virginia. Her early schooling was augmented by parental tutoring, a prevalent practice of African-American families in the early twentieth century. She later attended Hartshorn College for Women in

Richmond, Virginia, which later became a part of the Virginia Union University. It was there that she met and subsequently married her late husband of forty-eight years, Clarence M. Wood, Sr., on June 18, 1919.

Nannie was a devoted wife, an extraordinary homemaker and disciplinarian. She espoused values worthy of recognition which, when applied to her life, were deserving of imitation. Even during the Great Depression, she managed to provide all of the necessary developmental, spiritual and physical comforts for her family.

Mother was a member of the Helen Gooch Memorial Missionary Society, the Ladies Auxiliary of First Baptist Church and a past member of the Aeolian Chorus. She held membership with the Links, Inc., was a member of the Garden Club and the Six-O-Clock Club in Lexington, Virginia. Nannie traveled at some point and time to almost every continent in the world. She collected rocks from each country she visited for her hobby.

Blandome was always an "open house" for the children and grandchildren who grew up there and chose from time to time to return. Mother frequently told her children how her father led her to believe she was being taken home to the farm when she made a visit during a school break in 1914, but was led rather to Blandome where she resided until March 22, 1993.

There are many, many remembrances of mother indelibly imprinted in the minds of those of us who knew her best. There are two fond remembrances which quickly come to mind. First was her uncanny way of being there always when most needed and second, her personal prayer life which was exemplary and infectious.

Mother will be greatly missed by her children; Harry W. Wood of Lexington, Virginia, Bette Jo Swann of Richmond, Virginia, Clarence M. Wood, Jr. and Alexander B. Wood of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and Edward T. Wood of Old Westbury, New York; her grandchildren, John H. Hayes III, Ronald W. Hayes, Bette Marie Dixon, Cynthia E. Wood, Wanda A. Wood, Harry H. Wood, Dawn A. Wood, Fred W. Wood, Brian A. Wood, Edward T. Wood, Jr. and Rodney K. Wood; sons-in-law, John H. Hayes, Jr. and Fred S. Swann; daughters-in-law, Geraldine B. Wood, Freddye H.
