Jesus and Revolution



HISTORY OF THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

The Negro membership of the Manly Memorial Baptist Church, (except one Nancy) having asked for and obtained letters of dismissal, organized a new church in Lexington on Sunday night, September 22, 1867. A Presbytery consisting of Elders J. B. Cowen and J. Williams Jones organized them into the Lexington African Baptist Church. The membership of the new church was one hundred and fifty-two. They were well counseled, best wishes extended them, and a friendly feeling prevailed.

Members and friends worshiped approximately twentyfive years in the first church under the leadership of the following ministers: Clergymen Smith, Elliott, Jackson, Troy, Barksdale, Howard, Moss and Johnson. The latter served in the present church.

Brave men recognized the need of a larger and more modern edifice. Brother David Humbles lead a march giving twenty-five dollars; he was followed by Brothers Lylburn Downing, Joe Edmonson, Harvey Harper, Hugh Harvey, Richard Osborne, Robert Price, Phillip Pryor, and Jefferson Shields. This was not the only gift: they were joined by other friends and paid laborers who dug the foundation for our present church after working all day. Many of their wives and good wishers held lanterns and gave them moral support. Later came the masons, Mr. Irk Poindexter, the Moores from Amherst, Virginia, and the carpenter, Mr. Richard Jones: hence, the church we now worship in became a reality.

Over eighty years have passed since we have occupied our present church and one hundred and twenty years as a group praising our Maker. The building has been furnished, decorated, the lower sanctuary has been divided into classrooms, the parsonage has been built, a lot on the corner of Main and Henry purchased, and numerous other undertakings achieved. Our work is not completed; many things are yet to be accomplished.

A large number of organizations have been started and do exist in First Baptist. The surroundings have been attractive, God's word has been proclaimed, therefore, many souls have been won for Christ.
