

Hat-in-Hand Teacher Ousted from Principalship but Held in System

For about fifteen years
the Public School for Colored
children has been nominally
under the control of Mrs.

[REDACTED] For eight
years or more considerable
attention has been focused on
our institution and the admin-
istration, which have grown
worse apparently because of
the advancement of the times.

The first hitch came and
ruffled the waters of what
appeared to our citizens as a
perpetual reign, when a Meth-
odist minister by the name of
W. N. Holt, having two sons
attending the school, discovered
that it took ten long years in
this school for any pupil to
complete the course, which was
less when finished than the local
whites were doing in seven years.
Two years were required for each
of the first and second grades
one year each for the third, fourth
fifth and sixth grades and again
two years for the seventh. Count

and you will find the time to be ten years, a complete loss of three school years of a child's life.

When the attention of the School Board was call to this "special school" or the twentieth century model, the entire board were itot it more honorable to be guilty of neglect, than to be held responsible for an intellectual crime, declared that the conditions in question were

[REDACTED] as she had chosen them and not theirs; for as the clerk said the entire affairs were left with her. Now absolute faith on part of School Board, in the principal and the total mismanagement in interest of the people on part of principal indicates nothing less that a rotten, hopeless and shiftless school system as it effects our group here.

Many things happend for the good of the community in this skirmish. The same work which had taken ten years was done thereafter in eight; nine months were given for the school year whereas it was only eight; and

which persons would never countenance otherwise. The imperative need of providing high school training at home, because of the fact that most of our best institutions of learning are not providing any training below the College grades, we would in time have to stay home or seek high school grades at great distance and enormous expense, which should be provided for right at home in a town like ours. Nothing but a hot-in-hand, domineering spirit over her faculty has caused us to be the very last when it comes to educational progress, whereas in every other thing we are in the lead.

Thanks to 121 courageous citizens who petitioned that [redacted] must meet her Master, by stepping down to her size and let the stream of intellect flow which has been dammed by her for fifteen years. In her stead we have a new administrator of fine training and character, specially suited to usher us

the salaries for the Principal and her subordinates were all increased while the same teachers reaped the extra months pay and an increase salary for the nine months. The same teacher kept a dagger in their lesson for those who fought that all the people might benefit. Other benefits too numerous deserved to our good at this time.

Eight or more years have passed and as time demands new changes to let is wheels roll on ~~long day days almost~~ ~~length~~ with an educational dead-lock. In a community where education is the faith of the whites and their acquisition of it offers means for the negroes livelihood, we were face with the problem of dethroning an absolute ruler as principal or only a school with less than seven grades of elementary work forever. The spirit of selfishness would never have dictated a conscience that she should advocated something in the school superior to her capacity, and so long as [REDACTED] reigned our doom was at hand.

Fallertime forces changes

out of dense darkness into the
marvelous light. The person
in question is Prof. F.L. Allen of
the University of Michigan, to
whom we are looking for our
future salvation.

To our surprise, after having
been assured in every way that
[REDACTED] service would
terminate at the close of last
June, the local School Board
has seen fit despite the fact
we had imposed ^{in the} to reappoint
her as a subordinate teacher in
the system. Of course the good
"Old Darky" who has served her
masters so well must have some
reward, and certainly she has
served them. She has made
it possible for the whites to enjoy
the benefits of hundreds of dollars
a self-respecting principal could
have had spent for our children
which was only due us.

Her return next fall is of
much consequence, and with much
regret. First, the unpleasant continu-
ation of a fight to protest her as a
teacher. Second, because of her
disqualifications without doubt to
produce the goods. Third, the dis-
cord which is certain to take up

where it ended in June.

Fourth, the damaging effect it has on the spirit of the school and its running mechanism.

Prof. Allen's last will be no easy mark if out of the entire faculty he will only be able to rely on only one of his teachers as he did last year.

Now if there ever was any virtue in honor, pride and dignity

[REDACTED] might do well after all the humiliation which she chooses to suffer, to send in to the Board an honorable resignation rather than cling on to draw a salary against the wishes of any number of citizens other than the 12, written protesters.
