

THE COURSE OF STUDIES—FURNISHED BY DUE AUTHORITY.

P R E P A R A T O R Y .

The requisites for admission into the *regular College course*, are a competent knowledge of English Grammar, Geography and Arithmetic, especially Vulgar and Decimal Fractions and Proportion, an acquaintance with Latin and Greek Declension and Syntax, (the Grammars by Bullions are used,) and the reading of the following books or their equivalents: Jacobs' Latin Reader, Caesar, Virgil, Ovid and Cicero's Orations; Greek Reader throughout, and John's Gospel.

COLLEGE CURRICULUM FOR A. B.

—
FRESHMAN CLASS.

Latin.—Livy, (Lincoln's), Cicero de Senectute and de Amicitia. Arnold's first and second Latin books. Ancient Geography, (Mitchell's), and Roman Antiquities.

Greek.—Xenophon's Anabasis, Herodotus, Arnold's first Greek Lessons. Greek Antiquities.

Mathematics.—Smith's Algebra to Theory of Equations, Davies' Legendre, six books.

Composition and Declamation.—Exercises are required frequently.

SOPHOMORE CLASS.

Latin.—Pliny's Select Letters, Tacitus, Arnold's first and second Latin books, and Latin Prose Composition.

Greek.—Homer's Iliad, Xenophon's Memorabilia, Arnold's Greek Prose Composition.

Mathematics.—Theory of Equations, (Smith's Algebra), Geometry completed. Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, Mensuration and Surveying with practical exercises, including use of Compass, Level, Theodolite, Sextant, and Surveyor's Transit.

Elocution.—(Vandenhoff's) Exercises in Composition and Declamation continued.

JUNIOR CLASS.

Latin.—Horace's Odes and Epistles, Arnold's Latin Prose Composition.

Greek.—Demosthenes de Corona, Exercise in Greek Prose Composition.

Mathematics.—Analytical Geometry, (whole of Smith's Biot), Calculus, (Church's whole book.)

Natural Science.—General and Agricultural Chemistry, with use of apparatus, Mineralogy and Geology.

Mental Philosophy.—Logic, (Parker's) Reference to Aristotle, Locke, Reid, Stewart, Brown and Cousin.

Rhetoric.—Declamation and Composition continued.

SENIOR CLASS.

Latin.—Terrence, Satires of Horace, Juvenal and Persius. Exercises in Latin Composition.

Greek.—Woolsey's Greek Tragedies, viz: Alcestis, Prometheus and Antigone. Exercises in Greek Composition.

Mathematics.—Mathematical Mechanics (Boucharlat's), Fortification (Mahan), Gunnery (Ward and Knowlton).

Natural Science.—Practical and Mathematical Optics and Astronomy.

Moral Philosophy.—Evidences of Christianity (Alexander's), Political Economy (Wayland's), Constitution of United States, and Laws of Nations. Practical Exercises in the *Composition and Delivery of Public Orations* are continued through the whole of the senior year.

EXTRA COURSE.

Students who do not wish to take the full College course, are allowed to recite with the regular classes on any of the above studies, for which the Faculty shall judge them competent; it being understood that each shall have at least three recitations per day.

MILITARY INSTRUCTION.

Instruction and exercises in Military Tactics will be given by the Cincinnati Professor, whenever a class of sufficient size can be formed.

MODERN LANGUAGES.

Facilities are offered for studying the French, German, Spanish, and Italian Languages.

APPARATUS, LIBRARIES, AND CABINET.

The College has a very respectable Chemical and Philosophical Apparatus, which cost about five thousand dollars, and is kept in good order.

The Library contains about two thousand five hundred volumes; those of the two literary societies, three thousand five hundred in the aggregate. Provision is made for the gradual increase of the College Library, and the Societies display a highly commendable zeal in this cause.

The Cabinet of Natural History consists chiefly of minerals, of which there are about twenty-five hundred specimens, well adapted, by variety and arrangement, for illustrating the lectures on that important branch of natural science. Additional specimens are solicited.

RELIGIOUS AND MORAL CULTURE.

This is accounted of primary importance; as the increase of intellectual power is not a benefit or a blessing, unless placed under the controlling influence of right moral feeling. Our means of securing this all-important end, are, the regular morning and evening worship of the College assembled as a family; this consists of reading a portion of sacred Scripture, singing and prayer; Bible recitation on Sabbath; and the public lecture in the chapel. Students are also required to attend one other public exercise on Sabbath, in such place as their parents or guardians may direct. There is access, regularly, to service in the Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist, and Episcopal churches: and of course, we exercise no constraint as to which they shall attend, unless specially requested by parents. With these are combined the parental vigilance of the members of the Faculty, who have rooms in the College, and spend a large portion of their time in them. If these appliances, together with frequent, private, kindly conference with the students, fail of securing upright moral deportment and application to study, then, with conscientious severity, we carry out our law, Chap. I. 12.—“The Faculty shall require of all students, a strict obedience to the College laws and regulations; and they shall, in no case, suffer a disorderly, immoral, or negligent student to continue in the College, unless he soon amend his conduct after being duly admonished.” Parents may rely upon us, that we will not allow any youth to remain here, if we have reason to believe him endangering his moral welfare by the formation of bad habits. We are happy to be able to say, that more than one third of our students, at present, are consistent professors of religion; and it is our constant prayer, and shall be our unceasing endeavour, that He, whose is the residue of the Spirit, may descend as the rain and distil as the dew, until the proportion be greatly increased.

LOCATION AND TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

The geographical position of this College commands it to a very wide range of country. The whole of Virginia, west of the Blue Ridge, except the north-western corner of the State and a considerable portion that skirts its south eastern base, will find access to it easier than to any other College.

The unrivalled beauty of its mountain scenery, contributes not a little to its advantage, in the view of all persons who duly appreciate the power which the sublime scenes of nature operate upon the mind, and especially upon the youthful mind. It is not possible, that the eye of youth, under a course of intellectual training, should continually rest upon our undulating hills and rise to the summits of our majestic mountains, without lifting the spirit to something of their own sublimity.

EXPENSES.

The Treasurer's bill, per annum, is—Tuition, \$30; Room-rent, \$4; Deposit, \$8; Matriculation fee, \$2. Total, \$44, always payable in advance.

Boarding can be had in private families, for from \$8 to \$8 50 per month, payable in advance—making \$80 or \$85 per annum; washing, \$1 per month; fuel and light about \$12; bed [if rented] about \$7. Thus the highest necessary cost is \$158. Boarding, washing, fuel, and lights, can be had a short distance from town for \$7 per month. To Students entering after the 1st of February, the Treasurer's bill is only \$23.

A drawback of deposit money is made at the end of the session, which varies according to damages.

All parents or guardians who give money to their sons or wards, to pay any portion of their board in advance, as is usually done, are advised to require the immediate transmission of a receipt for the amount, as young men are often tempted by the possession of money, to waste it in extravagance or vice. And if parents or guardians desire that their sons or wards should make bills with the merchants in Lexington, they are requested to inform the Faculty of that desire; and in case bills are made contrary to law, they are especially requested not to pay them, but to forward them to the Faculty.

Since 1834, the Faculty have been required by an order of the Board, to admit to all the privileges of the College, *tuition free*, all *indigent young men*, of good character and talents, who may apply for such privileges.

Let all parents and guardians bear in mind the corrupting influence of pocket money. A pocket full of money and a head full of sense are rarely, if ever, found together in Colleges.

SOCIETIES.

The Graham Philanthropic Society was founded A. D. 1809. It has two thousand volumes in its library.

The Washington Literary Society was founded A. D. 1812, and has one thousand five hundred volumes.

The halls of both are tastefully fitted up, and are made the theatres of much exciting, emulous discussions, essays, and criticisms, greatly conducive to the welfare of the College and to the students' preparation for public employments.

THE SESSION—COMMENCEMENT—VACATIONS.

The Session opens on the second Thursday of September, and continues ten months, except a vacation of about ten days at Christmas.

The Commencement exercises will take place on the Thursday preceding the Fourth of July.

TRIENNIAL CATALOGUE
OF THE
ALUMNI.

The following is an attempt, and we regret to say only a partially successful attempt, at a complete list of our Alumni. This part of the early history of our beloved Alma Mater is involved in considerable obscurity. The high-minded and noble hearted men, who did what may be truly called the pains-taking and the self-denying part of the labour upon her early foundations, appear to have been little aware of the magnitude of their own work. Their hands were alternately occupied with the workman's tool, and the slaughter-weapon. And, when the savage Indian was repelled on the West, and the no less savage Briton and Hessian on the East, they had to contend with the pinchings of poverty; partly resulting from the exhaustions of the war and the derangement of the currency; but more from its demoralizing and paralyzing influence, which for some time pervaded the community and produced a dead insensibility to the importance of moral, intellectual and religious training. Attention being thus diverted toward procuring the means of life, these patrons of learning gave little of their anxiety to the enrolment and recording of names, and even to the formal conferring of degrees. Prior to 1805, no matriculation book seems to have been kept—no rolls or register. And yet, doubtless, some of the brightest names in our country's history, obtained here, before that, the mental and moral drilling which made them the glory of the age. The Alumni Association nine years ago, made an effort to remedy this defect, and adopted as the principle of their enrolment the rule of putting down all students who could be ascertained to have obtained the chief part of their education here—say two full years of study. The result of this attempt we have been kindly favoured with, by our late venerable and beloved President, and now present it, with such additions as we have been able to make, on safe grounds. Sure we are, it is very defective, we however hope it may form the basis, upon which the Alumni Association may, by additions and corrections, in a few years, complete the list of honoured names, and perpetuate, with freshness of recollection, so interesting a portion of the history of Washington College.

The Faculty earnestly solicit information that may enable them to correct the following list, for a future edition: either in regard to additional names or

titles, or location: or for the removal of names which may be improperly inserted. We wish the record to speak true history.
